





However, we were determined and not put off by the jungle's rough greeting.
- 2 For days, each step took us deeper into unexplored territory that was filled with unseen mysteries and the constant hum of life teeming all around us. Fortunately, my guide, Tuk, was a seasoned native. From the engulfing greens of the leaves and musky aroma of jungle flowers to the earthy scent of the soil beneath our feet, Tuk moved with the grace and ease of a jaguar. As I followed closely behind, my eyes meticulously scanned the entire terrain for any signs of impending danger, 10 while he skillfully wielded his sharp machete to slice through the dense foliage as easily as a hot knife through butter.
- 3 As the sun began to dip below the horizon, we finally arrived at a clearing. In the heart of this vast expanse, a colossal stone temple arose splendidly, while its pyramids exuded an aura of awe. However, their edges bore the marks of centuries of exposure to the elements. The faded carvings 15 on the stones, ancient glyphs and symbols, were all that remained. These were woven together like a tapestry of the past, narrating the story of a civilisation long lost to the sands of time. The air around it seemed to pulsate with a palpable sense of history and mystery, as if the temple held secrets and knowledge that had long been forgotten.
- 4 Moving forward with caution, Tuk firmly gripped the hilt of his machete. I followed closely, my heart 20 pounding with excitement and fear. We climbed the steep and narrow steps of the pyramid, which were covered in a layer of moss and vines. After overcoming this treacherous ascent, we finally reached the top! Our senses were awakened with the thrill of discovery as we gazed upon an endless expanse of green stretching as far as the eye could see. The trees and vines below us seemed to stretch out into infinity, while the tangled and impenetrable mass of vegetation could 25 swallow up a man in moments.
- 5 Suddenly, a deafening rumbling filled the air, and the ground began to shake. Tuk shouted urgently in his native tongue. With fear etched on his face, he scanned the horizon for any sign of what was to come. My blood froze as an immense wave of water surged towards me. Tuk grabbed my arm, pulling me towards the edge of the pyramid, his grip tight and unyielding. We looked out 30 across the water, watching as the wave grew closer and closer. Its relentless force was akin to stampeding elephants, threatening to burst from the sheer intensity of the moment. My mind raced as I tried to process what was happening. As the wave hit us, I was thrown from my feet, tumbling down the steep steps of the pyramid and crashing into the foliage below. The final impact was brutal for me. My body slammed into the hard earth with a sickening thud, and I could feel a wave 35 of immense pain lancing through my leg like a white-hot poker.
- 6 As the water receded, a trail of destruction was left in its wake. I struggled to my feet, my body aching and bruised. Tuk descended the pyramid with a determined expression, scanning the clearing for any sign of danger. I followed him, my heart still racing from the adrenaline of the moment. It was already evening. We had to navigate our way efficiently through the jungle and 40 quickly start a fire at the campsite, as we did not want the darkness to envelope the jungle like a

thick blanket. Eventually, dancing flames emerged, casting eerie shadows across the jungle. We sat in silence, our minds still reeling from the day's events.

The text below is about sneaker culture.

- 1 In the millennial-driven online luxury market, streetwear, athleisure and sports lifestyle brands are in the ascendant. Premium sneakers are ubiquitous on the feet of star athletes, musicians, and celebrities around the world. Such high-profile collaborations fuel a multi-billion-dollar global sneaker resale market that is expected to grow exponentially over the coming decade.
- 2 First invented in the 1860s in England for the upper-class playing racket games, sneakers were 5 long associated with function over fashion and did not achieve widespread recognition until the latter half of the 20th century. When the jogging and aerobics craze of the 1970s took off - one in which fitness was fun and anyone could be an athlete - sneakers began to gain traction as a fashion statement. However, their defining moment did not come until 1984 when Nike turned its sights to endorsing athletes. Michael Jordan received an unprecedented \$500,000 a year 10 endorsement deal. With the rising star now sporting the brand's sneakers on the court and Jordan's sneakers notoriously violating the dress code on the court, sneakers were symbolic not only of Jordan's exceptional talent, but of his willingness to challenge authority. As Jordan proved to be one of the greatest basketball players of all time, the sneaker's fame skyrocketed. Nike's Air Jordans debuted in stores the following year to whirlwind success and sparked a growing interest 15 and fascination with collecting sneakers amongst enthusiasts.
- 3 Sneaker culture began to take off beyond the basketball court too. Music groups well-liked by many released songs enthusiastically praising sneakers, which earned them endorsement deals with sneaker brands. For example, the influential hip-hop group Run-D.M.C. released their single 'My Adidas' in 1986. This undoubtedly increased the sneaker brand's visibility. Meanwhile, another 20 cultural shift was taking place as white-collar businesses introduced casual Fridays. This led to a proliferation of men's fashion items as men were suddenly allowed to put their suits aside and express their identity through accessories like shoes.
- 4 Nevertheless, the act of collecting sneakers remained a niche until the dawn of the digital age, when the advent of online marketplaces made possible a robust and wide-reaching secondary 25 market. As resellers began to mark the sneakers up at incredible costs, such actions only reinforced how special these shoes were. In fact, more collaborations between celebrities and luxury fashion houses like Chanel, Dior and Louis Vuitton led to the release of several novel designs. By the mid-2010s, sneakers had become recognised status symbols—literally, in the case of hip-hop artiste Drake, who, in 2016, commissioned a one-of-a-kind pair of Air Jordans 30 wrapped in 24-carat solid gold, which was retailed at an exorbitant \$2.1 million. Wearing rare and cool sneakers became an expression of one's social status. While sneakerheads¹ have drawn some flak for the lifestyle which they embody, it is not truly reflective of the whole culture. For some, this is simply a matter of personal preference and choice.
- 5 While some collectors of sneakers treat it purely as an investment, others want to own these 35 coveted pairs because they want to be a part of the stories behind these shoes. Owning sneakers can help one to feel connected to brands, people and cultural movements. Collecting sneakers has also brought sneakerheads a true sense of community through shared experiences, such as camping out all night for a release or looking out for one another on release day to get the pair of sneakers that they really want. Wearing sneakers also helps people to express their personal 40

beliefs. For instance, NBA player Dwyane Wade wore his custom-designed, limited-edition 'Black Lives Matter' Li-Nings on the court to raise awareness about the movement.
